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Year R Curriculum Letter - Autumn Term - Mrs Toy and Mrs Wilson

This half term, we will be learning about celebrations as a hugely important part of human life. We will be exploring the ways in which people and cultures, from every part of the world, take part in and hold celebrations to mark special events and special times in people's lives. Please read below to find out what else we will be learning this half term.

Literacy - Reading, Writing and Comprehension

In **phonics**, we will continue to learn the Set 1 sounds in the following order – k, u, b, f, e, l, h, r, j, v, y, w, z, x. Then we will begin to learn the following digraphs: sh, th, ch, qu, ck, nq and nk.

Reading:

Oral Segmenting — this is when you split a word up into its individual sounds (c-a-t). We call this 'Fred talk'.


Oral blending — this is when you blend the sounds together to say the word (cat). We use a blending arm motion from left to right to help blend the sounds together.

Writing:

We will continue to learn how to write the different sounds that we have learned. We will begin to label pictures by writing the first sound and then all the sounds in order.

Understanding the World

We will discuss changes across the four seasons and observe what happens from Autumn to Winter.

What do we celebrate?









Expressive arts and design

We will experiment with instruments to create firework noises. We will use a range of art materials and loose parts to create pictures of fireworks, poppies, Rangoli patterns and mehndi patterns.

Maths – The children will learn to:

Copy, continue and create their own patterns. Identify representations of 1, 2 and 3.

Subitise or count to find how many objects there are.

Count groups of objects by touching each object as they count and recognise the final number they say is the total.

Describe where things are in relation to other objects using positional language, such as 'on', 'under', 'next to', 'in front of' etc.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We will reflect on the following statements:

I know we are all different.

I know how we are different.

I know why someone might not feel

welcome.


I know how I can make someone feel welcome.










Ideas for supporting your child's learning:
