The focus of the first half of the Summer term is of course The Coronation of King Charles III. Yellow Class will be learning about the countries which make up the United Kingdom, the Royal family and of course what a coronation is. This will culminate in a Coronation Celebration on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> May. Alongside this on a Friday, Mrs Gilbert will be focussing on 'Moses, The Torah and Shabbat' learning about Judaism whilst making connections with Christianity.

#### <u>Literacy</u>

There are a number of Book studies this half term. Alongside reading all about King Charles III the writing focus is writing in the style of Oliver Jeffers in 'Stuck'. Studying different adaptations of Little Red Riding Hood before writing their own and using 'Story Path' by Madalana Matasos to write a story using a story mountain. Year 1's will focus on the correct formation of sentences, finger spaces between words and reading their work to make sure it makes sense. Year 2's focus will be the use of expanded noun phrases, planning their writing and editing to improve using purple pen.

#### <u>Geography</u>

Through Our Island of Great Britain, children will be asking and answering geographical questions about Great Britain and London. We will be identifying the capital cities of the countries of the United Kingdom. If you have an atlas at home, have a look at it with your child and discuss how they can be used. Encourage your child to find the countries which make up the United Kingdom and their capital cities. Identify countries you may have visited (or would like to) and find their capital cities.

# Moses, the Torah and Shabbat

#### RE - Judaism

Children will be studying another principle religion: Judaism. Through answering the following questions, they will find out about it's core beliefs and teachings.

Why is the Torah important to Jewish People?

Why do Jewish families celebrate Shabbat? How do Jewish People show they belong to God and each other?

Children will be relating what they find out to Christianity.

## <u>Maths</u>

Money – recognising coins, finding combinations of coins that equal the same amount of money. Compare amounts of money, recognise and use symbols for pounds and pence.

Time – Tell the time to the hour, half hour. Tell and write the time including quarter past/to the hour and draw the hands of the clock face to show the times.

Shape – Compare and sort common 2d and 3d shapes.

Fractions - Recognise, find, name and write fractions 1/3 , 1/4 , 2/4 and 3/4 of a length, shape, set of objects or quantity

At home you could look with your child for arrays such as ice cube containers or egg boxes. Look for opportunities to count in2's, 5's and 10's. How many pairs of shoes or sock are there? What is double or half a quantity of fruit or sweets?
