Year 3/4 Curriculum Letter - Spring Term 2 2024 - Mrs Farrelly

Red Class has been growing! A particularly warm welcome to all the new children who have recently joined Red Class, and their families. The children have all settled in brilliantly. This half term's learning experience is called, 'Protect our wildlife!' This learning experience will be a mixture of Science and Geography as we explore living things and their habitats as well as global issues like climate change and deforestation and how these are having a huge impact on the environment, the animals and their habitats.

Literacy - Reading, Writing and Comprehension

Our English work this half term will centre around the tale of the Animals of Farthing Wood which explores themes of tolerance, cooperation and friendship as well as global issues such as drought and deforestation. Writing opportunities inspired by our quality text will include animal poetry and writing to persuade.

Science

As scientists this half term, we will explore the five main groups of animals: mammals, fish, birds, reptiles, and amphibians, as well as plants. We will be recognising how living things can be grouped in a variety of different ways and using classification keys to help identify and group things in their local and wider environments. We will look at how changing environments can pose significant dangers to living things.

Maths - Fractions - The children will learn:

Year 3:

- to count up and down in tenths
- to recognise that tenths arise from dividing an object into 10 equal parts and in dividing one-digit numbers or quantities by 10
- to recognise, find and write fractions
- to recognise and show, using diagrams, equivalent fractions with small denominators
- to add and subtract fractions with the same denominator within one whole
- to compare and order unit fractions with the same denominators
- to solve problems that involve all of the above.

Year 4:

- to count up and down in hundredths
- to recognise that hundredths arise when dividing an object by one hundred and dividing tenths by ten.
- to solve problems involving increasingly harder fractions to calculate quantities, and fractions to divide quantities
- to add and subtract fractions with the same denominator
- to recognise and write decimal equivalents of any number of tenths or hundredths
- to recognise and write decimal equivalents to $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{3}{4}$
- to find the effect of dividing a one- or two-digit number by 10 and 100, identifying the value of the digits in the answer as ones, tenths and hundredths
- to round decimals with one decimal place to the nearest whole number
- to compare numbers with the same number of decimal places up to two decimal places

P.E.

For this half term, PE will be back to **Tuesdays** and **Wednesdays**. Tuesdays will be swimming at Westgate in the afternoons and Wednesdays will be PE in school in the afternoons. Just a reminder that children should wear PE kits to school on both these days and **please ensure children do not wear earrings into school on PE days.** For swimming, children need to bring: a bag big enough to fit all their swimming things in, a swimming costume or swimming shorts, a towel, goggles **and a swimming hat for qirls and any boys with longer hair.**

Library

The children will continue to visit the school library on Friday afternoons where they will listen to a story and also pick out new books to take home with them.

The children are encouraged to choose 2 books: 1 story book suitable to their reading level and 1 non-fiction information book. Please could children bring their books into school with them and take them home again each day so that they can read their books in school during quiet reading time and also at home. We want to promote a love of reading by enabling children to become engrossed in a book and to read it through from start to finish, rather than picking up new books each day to read short snippets from. It is particularly important children have their library books in school on Fridays so they can change them when we visit the library if they have **finished them**. If they have not finished their books, they don't need to change them in the library that week. Children should not have more than 2 books from the school library at any one time.
